 WP4 Workshop joined members from 20 European entities, focusing on *People Empowerment* its framework aims at the implementation of patient-centered eHealth solutions in all MS;

D.6.1 *Roadmap on future eHDSI use cases and features* received feedback from 11 parties, aiming the commitment on sustainable usage of NCPeH among MS and other countries;

Task 6.3 *e-Skills for Professionals* is running a pilot in Ireland, Portugal, Cyprus, Serbia and Hungary aiming to ensure the eSkills necessary for the implementation of European eHealth strategies and cross-border healthcare services;

Support for the Health Workforce Planning and Forecasting Expert Network "SEPEN"





SEPEN aims to

- strengthen collaboration on health workforce development that is a crucial activity to ensure sustainability of health systems in each MS of the EU
- facilitate the expert network that enables sharing good practices, exchange of knowledge, tools, methods, publications and expertise
- activate continuing policy dialogues on EU Health Policy Platform in prominent topics, e.g. workforce concation, recruitment and retention, mobility, skill needs, digital



SEPEN results

- Ensuring to disseminate findings and work undertaken by the Joint Action on European Health Workforce Planning and Forecasting (EU JAHWF 2013-2016)
- Building a community of health workforce experts and stakeholders: more than 300 experts joined SEPEN from 45 countries, various backgrounds: policy, academy, practising workforce etc.
- SEPEN reaches almost 600 **newsletter** subscribers
- 108 countries visit healthworkforce.eu website (75% Europe)
- In total 5 workshops and 10 webinars organised

SEPEN uptake and follow-up

- Discussions lead to informing decision-makers in health policy and governance on good practices in evidence-based policy making and support implementing actions e.g. replenishment strategies
- Different level of interest in MSs depending on the priorities of the national health policy agenda and goals
- Interest is high for knowledge and evidence, however long-term commitment for systematic interventions is lower
- Shared responsibility in the EU for health workforce monitoring
- Dialogues lead to sharing concrete methods and tools for planning e.g. data collections, planning models etc.



SEPEN benefits for EU citizens

- Developing the supply side planning e.g. composition of the workforce, combating lack of specialists, shortages, territorial imbalances, high/low in- or outflow from other EU MSs, strengthening the public health workforce
- Developing the demand side planning e.g. measuring and anticipating health consumption, forecasting the need for care
- Health workforce planning contributes to
 - effective, accessible, resilient and sustainable health systems,
 - better health services (equity, effectiveness, accessibility, efficiency)
 - better health outcomes of the population.

- Training course for inspectors: first action of its kind at EUlevel on inspection of medical devices manufacturers
- Communication platform for clinical experts: facilitating cooperation on clinical issue of EU-level importance





JAMS: uptake and follow-up

- Broader use of tools produced by JAMS to foster cooperation and coordination between Member States:
 - Training materials
 - Communication platform on clinical assessment
 - Guidances and templates
- Proposal for creating a Joint inspection group at EU-level
