- A paper on MDTs in cancer care in Europe setting the scene
- Implementation of standards for CCCNs ongoing together with ECCO and OECI
- Development of quality indicators (ongoing)





Action: uptake and follow-up

- There were concrete activities in following the European Guide for NCCPs in several MSs
- In Czechia a Comprehensive Cancer Control Network (CCCN) was built based on the principles laid out by the JA
- ECIS was set up at the JRC and functions alongside ENCR
- Quality standards for screening programmes and CCCNs





Action: benefits for EU citizens

- We provided an instrument for the planning and structuring of National Cancer Control Programmes – better planning
- The setup of the European Cancer Information System now with JRC – better data and analyses
- Comprehensive Cancer Control Networks better access and better quality of care
- Survivorship definition and conceptualisation

ERN: share, care, cure

- Access for all European patients to expert centers
- Knowledge travels, not the patient
- Sharing knowledge between experts and patients





ERN: results

- 24 networks on groups of rare conditions
- Sharing of knowledge with professionals and patients
- Training, education, data sharing, research





ERN: uptake and follow-up

- Initially, Western Europe
- At present, inclusion of missing MS
- In coming years, complete coverage of MS





ERN: benefits for EU citizens

- EU citizen with rare disease can trace the expert centers and obtain information on diagnosis and treatment
- EU citizen can get a digital consultation via a local health care provider
- EU citizen can participate in ERN activities, including dissemination





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
