



### Gary Cass

Managing Director, ICW Technical Services

15-year tenure as Head of Buildings for the National Trust, where he was responsible for ensuring his team of 120 Building Surveyors and 150 Direct Labour Craftsmen maintained the highest professional standards for the Trust's 28,500 buildings and structures.

As Chair of the Chartered Institute of Building Conservation Special Interest Group, he has coordinated the Heritage Certification Scheme, and also had a key role in the revision of BS 7913: 2013 - the industry standard for the Conservation of Historic Buildings.

He is a Fellow of the CIOB, a member of the IHBC and has an MSc in Building Conservation. He also holds Certification in European Heritage Site Management, and is fully certified as a Heritage Practitioner.



### **Professor John Edwards**

Director Edwards Hart Consultants, Professor on Practice University of Wales Trinity St David

Until 2014 John held one of the UK's most senior building conservation positions as Assistant Director of Cadw, the Welsh

Governments Historic Environment Service and prior to that worked for English Heritage. At Edwards Hart he leads on building conservation, sustainability, energy efficiency and project management and working across the UK and Ireland. John also leads on their education and management consultancy work and examples include contributing to the National Trust buildings review and the development of the CIOB Building Conservation Certification Scheme.

He contributes to the development of best practice which includes lead authorship of BS 7913: 2013: Guide to the Conservation of Historic Buildings, lead author of the RICS iSURV resource on 'Managing Risks in Building Conservation Projects' and a member of BSI committees covering both conservation and energy efficiency and retrofit. In his professor role he contributes to the education of students and practitioners in the UK and overseas. He is also a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Building (FCIOB).

## **Event Speakers**



### Professor Charles Egbu

Senior Vice President, CIOB

Professor Charles Egbu is Dean of School of the Built Environment and Architecture at London South Bank University, England, UK, where he holds the Chair in Project Management and Strategic Management

in Construction. His First Degree was in Quantity Surveying [First Class Honours] – Leeds Metropolitan University, UK, and he worked briefly as a site Quantity Surveyor for a large UK construction company. His Doctorate was obtained from the University of Salford, UK, in the area of Construction Management. He is a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Building (FCIOB), Fellow of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (FRICS), Fellow of the Association for Project Management (FAPM), Fellow of the Royal Society for the Encouragement of Arts, Manufacture and Commerce (FRSA), and Fellow of the Higher Education Academy (FHEA). He is currently Vice Chair of the CIOB Policy Board.

He has contributed over 350 publications in various international journals and conferences and has spoken at many conferences in his areas of expertise.



### Dr Alan Forster

Associate Professor and Programme leader for the MSc in Building Conservation, Heriot Watt University

Dr Alan M Forster is Associate Professor at Heriot-Watt University, Edinburgh.

He has 10 years industrial experience in building surveying, general construction and building conservation practice. He has worked in academia for over 12 years and has published extensively on a wide range of topics including; Traditional and low carbon building materials; Philosophical and technical approaches to fabric repair; Building pathology and maintenance; Survey, recording, evaluation and interpretation of historic buildings; and most recently he has undertaken research into the application of digital technologies utilised in support of historic building repair. Professionally he is a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Building (FCIOB); a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Historic Building Conservation (IHBC) and a Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings (SPAB) Lethaby Scholar.



### Dr Sabine Haag

President, Austrian Commission for UNESCO

Dr Sabine Haag holds a number of high profile roles within the heritage and art history world, including her current position as President of the Austrian Commission for UNESCO (the UN Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation). She is also Director General of the KHM-Museumsverband (Kunsthistorisches Museum, Weltmuseum Wien and Theater Museum) in Vienna. Prior to that, Dr Haag served for many years as the Director of the Kunstkammer and the Secular & Ecclesiastical Treasury of the Kunsthistorisches Museum. She also sits on a number of boards and committees, including the scientific advisory council of the Zentralinstitut für Kunstgeschichte (Central Institute for Art History) in Munich, the executive board of the Germanisches Nationalmuseum, Nuremberg, and the cultural executive board of the annual summer Bregenz Festival.

Dr Haag is also the author of countless papers, publications and lectures on baroque ivory, wax, amber and wood sculpture and the history of collecting and has collaborated on numerous research projects.



### David Hills

Partner | Architect, Purcell

David is a Conservation Architect, Heritage Consultant and educator, working on numerous listed buildings, Scheduled Ancient Monuments and World Heritage Sites in the UK and internationally. Equally

at home with design or technical issues or heritage reporting, David's skills bridge the gap between architecture and heritage consultancy. He lectures regularly on building conservation and his writings have been published in various national newspapers and journals, together with appearances on heritage-related BBC and Sky Arts television programmes.

David has been working as Conservation Architect at Battersea Power Station since 2013, with particular responsibility for the repairs to the external envelope, including brickwork and concrete. He also acts as Heritage Advisor for the internal fitout works and as Heritage Consultant for planning issues.



### Ros Kerslake

Chief Executive, The National Lottery Heritage Fund

Ros Kerslake OBE is Chief Executive of the National Lottery Heritage Fund. Ros trained as a solicitor before taking on leadership positions in the private sector

(Gulf Oil and Booker Group). Later, as Property Director of Railtrack, she developed an interest in place and urban regeneration, going on to lead RegenCo in the West Midlands.

In 2006 Ros became CEO of The Prince's Regeneration Trust, establishing it as a leading heritage-led regeneration charity. A key achievement was saving Middleport Pottery.

Ros is a non-executive director of U+I group, and a member of the Community & Voluntary Service Honours Advisory Committee. In 2016 Ros received an OBE for services to British Heritage. Ros holds two honorary doctorates, from Staffordshire and Keele Universities, for her work in heritage and regeneration, and has a degree in Law and Psychology and an MBA.



### Kate Mavor

Chief Executive, English Heritage

Kate Mavor is CEO of the English Heritage Trust, a charity formed in 2015 to conserve and promote 420 historic sites and over 500,000 artefacts, covering six millennia of England's history. These include

Stonehenge, Hadrian's Wall, Kenwood, Osborne, 66 castles and 84 ecclesiastical sites – as well as the London Blue Plaques. Previously wholly reliant on state funding, the charity is aiming for financial independence by 2022.

Kate was formerly CEO of the National Trust for Scotland, ProjectScotland and Language Line. Kate is a graduate and Honorary Fellow of Trinity College, Oxford, holds an honorary degree for services to conservation from Heriot Watt University and was formerly Trustee of the National Youth Theatre.



### Sean McNicholas

CMYA 2018 Gold Medal Winner

Sean McNicholas graduated from Northumbria University in 2002. He has worked in the industry as an operational lead in many sectors but most recently, in conservation and refurbishment. His

restoration of the Darlington Hippodrome and Theatre Hullabaloo in Darlington, earned him a gold medal at the CIOB Construction Manager of The Year Awards in 2018. He is a Member of the Chartered Institute of Building (MCIOB).



### Hannah Prowse

Pre-Construction Manager, Sir Robert McAlpine Special Projects

Hannah has followed a less traditional route into the construction industry, having trained as an Archaeologist at UCL, then working for Sotheby's before joining

Marie-Theres has over 15 years experience in export consultancy of SMEs with a strong focus on the British market. Marie-Theres has lots of experience with companies working in the heritage sector and has organised many different trade missions to the UK for enterprises to open up the British market.



### **Dr David Wilmore** Founder, Theatresearch

Dr David Wilmore was educated at Newcastle University where he became involved with the restoration of the Tyne Theatre & Opera House. On Christmas Day 1985 the stage house was gutted by

fire and he spent the next two years restoring the theatre a second time. He formed theatresearch in 1986 and has been involved in many theatre restoration projects including the Georgian Theatre Royal, Richmond [1788], Theatre Royal Newcastle upon Tyne [1837 & 1901], Theatre Royal, Bristol [1766] and the Gaiety Theatre & Opera House, Isle of Man [1900]. He has a PhD in the development of nineteenth century stage technology, is a past Chairman of the Association of British Theatre Technicians, Chairman of the OISTAT Research Commission, a Leverhulme Post-Doctoral Research Fellow at the University of Manchester researching James Winston and The Theatric Tourist, and a visiting scholar at the University of Hull.

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The European Heritage Academy is an internationally certified training initiative. The education was mainly developed in the EU project MODI-FY (Maintaining Historic buildings and Objects through Developing and Upgrading Individual Skills of Project Managers: Fostering European Heritage and Culture for Years to come) for all professional groups working on historic buildings and is also based on practical experience. The Academy is currently operated by the Burghauptmannschaft Österreich (BHÖ) in cooperation with the Federal Monuments Office, Information and Further Education Centre for Monument Preservation, in the Charterhouse Mauerbach, Austria and started the regular operation with the first module in December 2017.
